New Year, New Digs!

From November 2018 through February 2019, the clinic underwent extensive renovations designed to improve efficiency and to provide a safer work environment for employees. The renovations were fully funded by an anonymous donor who believes in the clinic's mission. The renovations included a new centralized front desk area that provides check in services for both medical and dental, streamlining the check-in process for patients and providing more work space for employees. Video cameras, keyless entries and combined work space make it a safer environment. The clinic also got an updated look with new ceilings, new floorings and fresh paint throughout the entire building. LED lighting was added throughout, decreasing the clinic's energy use by 75 percent.

"We couldn't be prouder of the brand new space. You can see it on the looks of our patients when they come in the door. They are thrilled and appreciate the new bright open look. Our providers and staff are honored to call the clinic home," said Krista Woolly, Executive Director. The clinic has been at its current location since 2000 with parts of the facility's décor and furnishings dating back to the 1970s.

The clinic hosted an Open House in September to share the renovations with the community. During the Open House, the clinic staff provided tours, offered chair yoga

instruction and hosted a healthy cooking demonstration. The event was attended by 200 people.

From the Executive Director:

Are we meeting the needs of the community?

At the clinic, we are always asking, "are we meeting the needs of the community?" Or, in other terms, "are we relevant?" In the ever-changing world of healthcare, our organization must stay nimble, must reach out and ask the question about being "connected" to those we serve. In 2019, we tackled Hepatitis C, which is a chronic condition that has become an epidemic nationally as well as locally. In North Carolina alone, an estimated 110,000 people are living with chronic Hepatitis C. Between 2010 and 2014, North Carolina experienced a threefold increase in the number of acute Hepatitis C infections reported, associated with the twin epidemic of IV drug use. However, drug use is not the only risk factor; others include healthcare workers, people with a prison record, those with tattoos and piercings and even those born between 1945-1965. Thankfully, in the last 5-6 years, medications have been developed that can CURE a person. Previously, patients were told they would eventually die from complications of the disease.

In the fall of 2018, Dr. Amy Wilson, Medical Director, attended a one-day "boot camp" and subsequent teleconference meetings hosted by CHAMP – Carolinas Hepatitis Academic Mentoring Program, a partnership between the North Carolina Public Health Department and the University of North Carolina and Duke University medical schools. The goal is simple: to train primary care physicians to diagnose, care for, and cure persons

infected with Hepatitis C. Armed with this new knowledge and support from her CHAMP mentors, Dr. Wilson set out to cure those in Rowan County and specifically patients of the clinic that have the disease. Rowan County Health Department collaborated with the clinic in providing the lab work needed as well as immunizations required before treatment could begin. "The work that the health department does for us in the form of labs and immunizations is invaluable," states Dr. Wilson. In 2019, 14 clinic patients were cured of Hepatitis C....14 people given as one patient said "a second chance at life." Wow hearing those words makes everything we do at the clinic WORTH it. Please know if you are reading this annual report, you have been a part of this "new life" too. Yep, I'd say we are meeting the need.

Healthy Cooking Demonstrations

As part of the Clinic's focus on Lifestyle Medicine, Healthy Rowan staff provided healthy cooking demonstrations in the clinic lobby during patient care hours. Healthy Rowan works to educate, collaborate, and advocate for a healthier Rowan County. The clinic is intimately involved in this organization and follows through by introducing new, non-clinical ways to improve health to its patient population. Through these cooking demonstrations, patients and visitors are introduced to new vegetables and the different ways to prepare them. Recipes featured included: salmon patties, feta bruschetta, and asparagus, cherry tomato and feta saute. Patients also learn how to read food labels, how to eat "in season" and about correct portion sizes. "We're finding that our patients have never been introduced to things like fresh asparagus. They taste it, love it and start making it for their families on a regular basis at home. Little changes like this can make a big difference in their overall health," said Dr. Amy Wilson, Medical Director.

Salisbury Lions Club

In keeping with the long time mission, the Salisbury Lions Club is providing monthly visual screenings to patients at the Community Care Clinic. Lions Club members use a high tech Spot Vision Screener to provide visual screenings and look for conditions such a near sightedness, far sightedness, astigmatism and ther potential problems. Patients that qualify are referred to a local eye doctor for a more in-depth eye exam and provided with glasses as needed. "When we found out that the Community Care Clinic had vision needs, we were thrilled to partner with them in helping our community," says Rik Spencer, monthly volunteer.

Little Library

A new "Free Little Library" was gifted to the clinic by Louisa Parrish, a senior at Gray Stone Day School. The portable library is stocked with both adult and children's books and is open to the community. Painted in the clinic's signature red and featuring the heart shaped stethoscope, the library was created specifically for the clinic. "I chose to work with the Community Care Clinic as a site for one of the Little Libraries because I knew the location would be successful. Not only are we able to provide books to those who might not have access otherwise, but the staff and the board were excited and supportive. 
